Crews worked February 5 to restore power to 122,927 customers in Maryland after freezing rain and icy conditions knocked down trees and power lines across the State.

Electric-grid officials rerouted power and made repairs, and no one has been arrested in connection with the attack.

- 5. February 4, Associated Press (North Dakota) Feds: Oil from Dakota fields improperly classified. Officials with the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration announced February 4 that crude oil transferred from North Dakota's Bakken region to rail loading stations was misclassified and proposed fining 3 companies involved in the shipments, Hess Corp., Whiting Oil and Gas Corp., and Marathon Oil Co., a total of \$93,000. A train with 72 tank cars of Bakken oil derailed in Quebec and exploded in July 2013, killing 47 people and destroying 30 buildings. - 6. February 4, Salt Lake Tribune (Utah) Utah oks final \$5.35 million Chevron settlement for Willard Bay spill. The Utah Division of Water Quality and the Division of Parks and Recreation approved a \$5.35 million settlement agreement with

Chevron stemming from a 27,500-gallon diesel fuel spill at Willard Bay State Park in March 2013 that will be divided into three parts which includes mitigation projects and future projects.

- 10. *February 5*, *Associated Press* (Florida) **Officials: 22 charged in Fla. insurance fraud ring.** Authorities in Florida announced that they broke up an alleged home insurance fraud ring operating in south Florida that used fraudulent claims to defraud insurers of at least \$7.6 million. Twenty-two suspects were arrested, including the alleged ringleader who worked as a licensed public adjuster.

Authorities seized thousands of credit card numbers and other information during the arrests and expected more arrests to follow.

14. February 4, Portland Press Herald – (Maine) Ex-Maine loan officer admits \$14 million fraud scheme. A former loan officer for Portland-based KeyBank pleaded guilty February 4 to using others' identities to obtain \$14 million in loans and lines of credit that he used for personal expenses. He was also charged with evading \$1.3

million in taxes between 2006 and 2011.

The leak was contained February 4 and county officials stated that cleanup of the spilled fuel will take about 2 weeks.

The Oregon Health Authority is working with the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to investigate the source of a Campylobacteriosis outbreak that has sickened six individuals in Ohio, Oregon, and Washington. Each case is linked to consuming undercooked or raw chicken livers processed at Draper Valley Farms in Mt. Vernon, Washington.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service announced that ConAgra Foods of Pennsylvania recalled approximately 54,673 pounds of chicken noodle soup products that were misbranded as "Healthy Choice Chicken with Rice" soup and do not declare wheat and egg on the label. The product was distributed to retailers nationwide, and in the Dominican Republic, Jamaica, and Puerto Rico. The products were sent to retailers and restaurants in Arizona, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico, and Texas.
