The U.S. Chemical Safety Board released a report June 5 stating that multiple failures and improper testing of the blowout preventer failed to prevent the 2010 BP oil spill, attributing several failures to bad management and operations. Authorities noted that the hazards found during their investigation continue to remain a problem for the offshore drilling industry and recommended new safety standards and regulations.

Chrysler announced two recalls, with the first covering 21,000 model year 2014 Dodge Ram ProMaster vehicles due to an electrical issue with components that support airbag deployment, external lighting, and propulsion. The second recall affects 10,700 model year 2014 Dodge Durango and Jeep Cherokee vehicles due to a cruise control issue.

The guilty plea deal includes the payment of \$51 million in restitution to the bank and investors, along with jail time. The driver was unharmed and crews were dispatched to clean the road.

An investigation into the derailment is continuing. Rite Aid issued a voluntary recall for approximately 560 16-ounce containers of its Thrifty-branded Mint 'n Chip ice cream due to misbranding and undeclared nuts. The product was sold exclusively in Rite Aid stores in California.

12. June 5, Middletown Times Herald-Record – (New York) Kingston approves \$3.1 million in improvements to water treatment. City officials approved plans June 3 for improvements to the Edmund T. Coonan Water Treatment Plant in Kingston, New York, June 3. The \$3.1 million project will include replacing underdrains of filters and replacing a 50,000 gallon backwash tower with a 100,000 gallon tank to help flush out water, making the water system more efficient and in compliance with water quality

regulations.

13. June 4, Attleboro Sun Chronicle— (Massachusetts) EPA slaps Attleboro with \$32,000 penalty. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency issued a \$32,000 fine June 3 against Attleboro's water department for a May 2013 accidental discharge of partially treated drinking water into Orr's Pond. Workers were draining four concrete pretreatment basins at the plant for routine maintenance and pumped the water into a retention pond which overflowed.

Authorities continue to investigate after employment application processing was switched to a different system and the affected machine was pulled from the network.

18. June 6, Securityweek – (International) RIG Exploit Kit used to deliver "Cryptowall" ransomware. Researchers with Cisco Systems found the RIG Exploit Kit is being used to manipulate malicious advertisements being shown on popular Web sites in order to lead users to Web sites that attempt to drop the Cryptowall ransomware. Exploits for Java, Silverlight, and Flash have been used on the malicious sites in order to infect users.

19. *June 5, Help Net Security* – (International) **OpenSSL releases patches for critical MITM, code execution flaws.** The team behind OpenSSL released security updates that close six vulnerabilities, two of which are considered to be critical. Users were advised to apply the patches as soon as possible.

20. June 5, The Register – (International) Security bods mop blood, sigh: NEW CryptoLocker zombies? We don't see their kind. Heimdal Security researchers found that the number of CryptoLocker ransomware infections declined significantly since an international law enforcement takedown operation against the infrastructure powering the Gameover Zeus botnet used to spread the ransomware. The researchers noted that the weekly run rate of the ransomware dropped from tens of thousands to the low hundreds.

Gas service was cut off

to the area and people were allowed to return to their homes and businesses while crews worked to repair the line.

25. June 5, Montgomery County Times Herald – (Pennsylvania) Montgomery Commons gas leak in Montgomery Township under investigation. A gas leak and a suspected underground fire near the Montgomery Commons Shopping Center in Pennsylvania June 4 forced the shopping center to evacuate and close for several hours while crews ventilated the building and contained the leak. Eleven businesses that were deenergized during repairs to underground electric cables were expected to have power restored June 5.

A YMCA in Dover, Delaware, was evacuated and closed for the day June 5 after a company delivering pool chemicals accidentally mixed meuriatic acid and chlorine, causing a chemical reaction and leak inside a storage area in the basement. State officials removed the materials from the building, and the YMCA was scheduled to reopen June 6.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration cited Dollar Tree Stores Inc., with four violations of safety standards at a store located in Missoula following an investigation that was initiated after the agency received a complaint about dangerous conditions at the facility in November 2013.
